HISTORICAL SOCIETY SETS PROGRAMS FOR 2007

The Auglaize County Historical Society has planned a full schedule for the upcoming year. Lectures, workshops, even concerts are part of the Historical Society's 2007 offerings.

Here's a sneak peek at what's in store:

The Historical Society teams up with the folks at Glynnwood to celebrate the 150th anniversary of St. Patrick's Catholic Church. Join us at 2 p.m., March 25, for a concert of Irish music with the Columbusbased band known as the Ladies of Longford.

In another successful collaboration, the Historical Society and the Downtown Wapakoneta Partnership successfully applied for a spot on the Ohio Historic Preservation Office's 2007 Building Doctor program (date: TBA). The event will include an evening lecture about how to take care of your historic home, store, church, or other building. (In this case, historic means 50 years or older, so that includes lots of Auglaize County building owners!) The visiting Building Doctors will also tour local buildings to help their owners solve specific problems. Look for more information in

the next newsletter.

On May 18 and 19 the Historical Society will host a gravestone restoration workshop. Presenters will include the Gravestone Groomer himself, John Walters, who assists the Indiana Historical Society with all of its cemetery preservation seminars.

Participants at the May event will learn how to clean tombstones, locate missing pieces of stones, level stone bases, build new bases, etc. If you're interested, please contact the Historical Society for a registration form (available after January 1).

THE NATIONAL REGISTER IN AUGLAIZE COUNTY

The National Register of Historic Places is the nation's official list of cultural resources worthy of preservation. Properties listed in the Register include districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that are significant in American history, archaeology, engineering, and culture. The National Register is admin-

istered by the National Park Service. Did you know that almost 90 Auglaize County buildings are included in the 80,000 listings of the National Register of Historic Places? Inclusion in the National Register contributes to preserving historic properties in a number of ways:

Recognition that a prop-

erty is of significance to the Nation, the State, or the community.

Consideration in the planning for Federal or federally-assisted projects.

Eligibility for Federal tax benefits.

Qualification for Federal assistance for historic preservation, when funds are available.

OHS DESIGNER PRESENTS WORKSHOP FOR ACHS

Bill Mahon, Director of Exhibits for the Ohio Historical Society, Columbus, presented a workshop entitled "Creating a Visual Hierarchy" on October 19. Audience members included representatives of the Auglaize County Historical Society, which hosted the event, as well as volunteers from the Cridersville, Minster, New Knoxville, and Van Wert

historical societies.

Mahon, who has worked for the Ohio Historical Society for 16 years, and designed the updated exhibit space at the Neil Armstrong Air and Space Museum, spoke about the need to reach out to visitors at all interest levels.

He advised those present to create exhibits that are direct, simple, and uncluttered, that develop a consistent theme or message, and that answer the basic questions of who, what, when, where, why, and how. "Too much information turns people away." Mahon also visited the Wapakoneta Museum and provided specific suggestions for improving the exhibit space at the site.

NATIONAL REGISTER INCLUDES MANY AUGLAIZE LANDMARKS

In addition to a number of private homes, the following public and commercial buildings are listed in the National Register of Historic Places:

Fort Amanda, Auglaize County Courthouse, Blume High School (Wapakoneta), First Presbyterian Church (the Wapakoneta Museum), H.E. Fledderjohann House, Doctor's Office, and Summer Kitchen (the New Knoxville Historical Society), Fountain Hotel (the Fort Barbee Apartments, St. Marys), Minster Elementary School, John H. Nichols House (now Spencer Real Estate, Wapakoneta), and Uniopolis Town Hall. St. Augustine Church (Minster), St. John's

Church and Parish Hall (Freyburg), St. Joseph's Church (Egypt), St Joseph's Church and School (Wapakoneta), and St. Patrick's Church (Glynnwood) are listed as part of the Land of the Cross-Tipped Churches. And 65 downtown buildings form the Wapakoneta Commercial Historic District.

NOVEMBER 2 LECTURE HIGHLIGHTS HISTORIC COINS

The Historical Society will host the last event in its 2006 lecture series, "Collecting Old Coins," on Thursday, November 2, 7:30 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church, Moulton, 33A. The event is free and open to the public.

The lecture will be presented by John Brownell, who has collected and appraised coins for more than a quarter century. Brownell is also the owner of A to Z Coin and Jewelry Exchange, Lima.

Audience members are welcome to bring old coins with them for Mr. Brownell's review.
